Marie Dennis serves as Co-President of Pax Christi International, a global Catholic peace network with long ties to Sudan. In this capacity she has participated in numerous Pax Christi research efforts examining ethnic conflict in the South.

As director of the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns in Washington, DC, Marie Dennis is responsible for bringing the voice and experience of the Maryknoll missionaries and their commitment to peace, social justice and the integrity of creation into policy discussions in the U.S. and other governments, the World Bank, the IMF, the United Nations and the corporate world. She has a wealth of international experience, particularly in Latin America and Africa, and is author or co-author of several books on the spirituality of peace and social justice.

The Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns is a member organization of Pax Christi International, of which Marie has been co-president since 2007. Previously she served as a Pax Christi USA Ambassador of Peace, as a member of the Executive Committee since 1999, and as Vice President until 2007. A laywoman and mother of six adult children, she has worked for Maryknoll since 1989. She is a member of the Assisi Community in Washington, D.C. and is a contributing editor for *Sojourners* magazine.

BARRY HART

Barry Hart is a professor of Trauma, Identity and Conflict Studies in the Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University. He is the Academic Director of the Center, as well, and from 1997 to 2010, held the same position in the Caux (Switzerland) Scholars Program, taking an active role in the Human Security conference in Caux in July 2009.

Dr. Hart has conducted workshops on trauma healing and reconciliation in Northern Ireland, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Burundi, and among Rwandan refugees in Tanzania. He lived and worked in the Balkans, developing and leading trauma and conflict transformation programs. He also was engaged in a three-year peacebuilding institute and curriculum development project between EMU and the University of Hargeisa in Somaliland (2008-2011).

He earned his B.A. degree from the University of Maryland, M.Div. from Eastern Mennonite University, and Ph.D. from the Institute for Conflict Analysis and Resolution at George Mason University.
